There's a new kind of programme on television, and it's hardly like television at all! It's called reality TV and, as the name suggests, it is supposed to show us something very real. The participants aren't actors at all, but ordinary people in their daily lives. We, the viewers, might see them eating, sleeping, arguing or having a good time. We can hear all their conversations and watch their every move. Reality shows, therefore, are not regular television programmes at all. Instead they give us a close-up looking to other people's lives.

Why have reality shows become so popular? What makes us want to watch reality shows on TV? To begin with, we feel that we get to know the participants. We know their names from the beginning and gradually we learn more about them. Besides, reality shows take us inside the lives of other people. Mostly, people wonder what it's like to be someone else. Experiencing other people's lives can be a great escape from our own.

Nowadays, reality shows of all kinds account for about 40 per cent of TV's prime time. Reality TV has become the main source of entertainment of televisions. Not only has society become obsessed with the diverse themes of these shows, but completely invested in these "real" people. Due to its popularity and inexpensive production value, studios have a deep desire to maintain and create this kind of shows. New reality shows appear all the time. They can take place on a farm, in an apartment or even on an island. Each time a new show begins, it seems to be even more daring than the previous one.

Whether it is from exposing your talents and skills, to plainly degrading yourself, it is safe to say that the demand will continue to increase. Average people will always want to become famous overnight.
